Docent Education Volunteers

Without the more than 4,200 hours of dedication and effort donated to the Zoo by its inspiring docents, much of what the Zoo is able to accomplish would not be possible. Their desire and drive to support the Zoo's mission is an integral part of our success.

Docent Education Volunteers are an important part of the Little Rock Zoo's Education program. This group of specialized volunteers completes a two weekend training course along with a 48 hour shadow program to learn all about the Zoo's animals, animal handling and how to do animal programs.

Docents that handle our birds of prey and other animals undergo even more specialized training and are required to keep anywhere from 70-100 hours of service annually. This dedicated core of volunteers conducts animal meet-n-greets for guests, assists with education programs and helps with other education events. The Little Rock Zoo would not be able to do the great education outreach work we do without our docent volunteers!
